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CHAIR OWENS: Call to order the Full Commission meeting. Welcome everybody here. Thank you for coming today. Thank to all the members showing up to help with the quorum.
(Roll Call).
CHAIR OWENS: The minutes of the 9/21/21 meeting are published at the website. DELEGATE KILGORE: I make the motion
to approve.
SENATOR LUCAS: I second that motion.
CHAIR OWENS: Any discussion?
(No response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Hearing none.
All those in favor, say aye.
(Affirmative response.
CHAIR OWENS: All those opposed?
(No response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Minutes are approved.
At this time, is there any public
comment? Anybody in the public want to come forward?
(No response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Being none, we'll go to
the Committee reports. I'll start off with the
Executive Committee Reports.
The Executive Committee met about an
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hour ago. We had one recommendation. I can't make the motion. I can read the --

MR. FEINMAN: I'll read the motion
that the Committee recommended. The Committee recommends that the Commission accepts the Executive Committee's recommendation to delegate authority to the Executive Director to negotiate and execute any documentation necessary to release Grant 2275, and notwithstanding security interest associated CCAM property prior to its transfer to Virginia Department of General Services.

DELEGATE KILGORE: I so move.
MR. MILES: Second.
CHAIR OWENS: Move is properly
seconded. Anything on the second motion?
(No response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Hearing none, all those in favor, signify by saying aye.
(Affirmative response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Opposed?
(No response.)
CHAIR OWENS: They ayes have it. The motion is approved. That is the report of the Executive Committee.

The Education Committee, Senator

Lucas, you are going to make that report.
SENATOR LUCAS: Mr. Chairman, for the reassessment of workforce financial aid of funding. Do you want me to give the entire motion or just do the motion?

MR. FEINMAN: That's up to you.
SENATOR LUCAS: I'd like to move the Commission accept the Education Committee's recommendation to approve a tiered reduction for workforce financial aid funding starting at 30 percent for the upcoming fiscal year and 50 percent for the next fiscal year. That is my motion.

DELEGATE KILGORE: Yes.
MR. MILES: Second.
DELEGATE KILGORE: I was just going
to say that $I$ got calls from some of the western
community colleges who are very concerned about this reduction. I just wanted to bring that to the members's attention that they were concerned that it was going to affect the skills areas, such as welding, things of that nature. That was a concern that they had. They couldn't get here because they were worried about getting here with the snow. They wanted me to bring to you all's attention.

MR. MILES: I would echo similar
sentiment from Southside Virginia Community College and communications that $I$ have had too.

SENATOR RUFF: Mr. Chairman, I understand some of the concerns that dealt with this related to the state program, Fast-Forward Program, that gave 100 percent tuition for some programs, that don't think it took into consideration the fact that there are programs that are offered at the various community colleges that are regional. An example would be the truck driving program at Southside. They are one of the very few community colleges that do the truck driving direct. Most community colleges contract with private employers. For that reason, the state has chosen not to include that.

But if you have seen the news, there is a desperate need for truck drivers.

I don't know how much it dealt with the medical community. There are needs for nurses, for all the associate fields of medicine at that level.

If we are going to bring the Commonwealth, this region, up to the standards we need, w need to bring those people into the workforce. Community colleges is the best for them.

CHAIR OWENS: Anybody else have any
comments?
DR. EHRHARDT: For the benefit of the members who weren't here, the 30 percent approach was a compromise from the original. Evan, correct me, if I'm wrong. I think what we demonstrated, it could be reduced to up to 70 percent through G3 funding. To give the community colleges more leeway, Delegate Rasoul suggested a tier approach, where we start with the 30 percent.

I view that as a pilot. Let's see how a year goes. If they are short, we can go back and change that.

I think the challenge that I'm having trouble reconciling, the fact we are seeing from our analysis that students are able to get both sets of funds, but we have the community college saying that is not the case. But we don't have that data on an individual student level. Until we do, I think we need to go with the 30 percent, as we discussed yesterday, and see how it goes.

SENATOR RUFF: Mr. Chair, I
understand and I appreciate that, but I think it is better to get facts before we make the cut, rather than make the cuts and say, look, we shouldn't have done that.

DR. EHRHARDT: Senator Ruff, I agree with Mr. Chairman. I agree, but $I$ think it may be fair to allow, and you can speak to this, about the analysis they have done. We have some facts in that we could reduce it by 70 percent and still cover it.

MR. FEINMAN: The staff spent months working with the community colleges and doing analysis on the workforce financial aid that we have already done. What we found was confirmed by our colleagues, which was that $G 3$ covers about 70 percent of what we were supporting with our workforce financial aid. Now G3 exists.

The question is, do we continue
funding at the level we were funding prior to G3 existing, or do we recognize that $G 3$ has entered the funding mix, and re-task. No one is suggesting that we remove these funds from the higher ED or community college. Rather, we are saying, can we move some of these funds into another category that is higher priority, given that G3 has assumed some of the responsibility. The Commission, frankly, led the way. That is the theory.

Get the community colleges to support more apprenticeships and work study programs, or other things, wraparound services like childcare and

1 transportation, and non-traditional time instruction.

CHAIR OWENS: Mr. Blevins?
MR. BLEVINS: Yes, sir. I received several calls from the western part of our footprint. I was asked to share that this might be premature, until we have had time to discuss policy and provide a better understanding, the community colleges. I just wanted to share that with you.

SENATOR RUFF: Mr. Chairman, I would move that we table this, and instruct the community colleges in the footprint to pull together the data as to what they actually need, and then we can take a more appropriate action at our next meeting. MR. MILES: I'll second that. MS. CAPPS: Mr. Chair, I just want to clarify --

CHAIR OWENS: Hold on. We've got a motion and a second.

MR. MILES: Subject to. CHAIR OWENS: Okay. MS. CAPPS: I just wanted to clarify that part of the decision making had to do with our ability to take applications in the spring, so that so we could submit or have financial aid funds for the next school year.

CHAIR OWENS: So it is not this
fiscal year?
MR. FEINMAN: Financial aid for the academic year beginning August of 2022. So we have to fund. They have to let them know what financial aid is going to be. We have to accept applications for that program. So if we don't resolve that today, we're not going to be able to, unless we have a special meeting, we are not going to be able to take in applications ahead of the May meeting and still get them their funds, because they won't know what they are applying for. I suppose they could apply for either the full amount or the reduced amount, and not just know what the total value of the award is going to be appropriated. I'm looking there. I want to make sure we can do that.

MS. KIM: I think it would be a much more difficult evaluation process, because if people are applying for a lot more than is available, the staff would have to really closely evaluate. You could accept the application and then make the decision based on our available budget the next May meeting.

CHAIR OWENS: Are you suggesting -DELEGATE KILGORE: She answered my
question.
CHAIR OWENS: It looks like the simplest way to handle this would be to not make any changes right now. Come back with the data for an Education Committee meeting in May, and then make the decisions for the next --

MR. FEINMAN: I'd say I'm not sure what additional data there is to consider. We know what G3 funding is. We know what our level is. We know what we have paid in the past. We know what we would be funding in the future.

CHAIR OWENS: Okay.
MR. FEINMAN: I certainly believe in for small seat conservative being careful and cautious when we maintain the landscape. To be honest, I'm just not sure what we have, the staff.

DELEGATE KILGORE: Mr. Chairman, wouldn't a meeting for the Education be before the May. Can we set up something before the May meeting, in April or something, just so see what is going on? Couldn't the Education Committee meet before the May meeting?

CHAIR OWENS: Mr. Morrissey?
MR. MORRISSEY: Thank you, Mr.
Chairman.

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It may very well be, as Mr. Feinman said, there is little or no additional information that we'll gather. But I agree with Senator Ruff. I think it is prudent to seek that information, seek that data before a decision is made. I don't know if it has to be put off until May. They have these new Zoom meetings without having to gather, without gathering like we are now in person.

When the motion to table comes up for vote, I will be in support of that.

DELEGATE RASOUL: Mr. Chair, this was a robust conversation yesterday, and clearly, there is a lot of politics involved. The staff has presented pages and pages of pretty objective information. I know it is tough. Trust me, I know the community colleges are doing work for us.

I think what really helped us yesterday in the conversation is that the money is not being taken away. It is being repurposed into, what we had suggested was, there were staff suggestions, was to apprenticeships, and insuring that we could bridge the gap further. Because the whole point was to further retention efforts. I mean, if we can transition some of these students into apprenticeships, we can help bridge them with the

1 industries that they need.

I hope as we move along in the process here, that we think long and hard about, not only the data that is very clear and objective in front of us, but also, how can we be innovative in insuring that we're serving the students the best, and not just allowing for some protection around some of these dollars. We have got to innovate, if we are going to move forward. I'll stop there. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIR OWENS: Thank you.
SENATOR LUCAS: Mr. Chair, perhaps I should have completed the motion, but there is a Part B to it. If you look on Page 25, you'll see that the second motion would have been that the Commission accept the Education Committee's recommendation to focus funding award, that is Option B on Page 25, which also addresses the expansion for apprenticeships or other work study programs that support employers in the region. That way, the community colleges would be, as I understand, they would make applications for those. Am I correct?

MR. FEINMAN: That's correct.
CHAIR OWENS: Any other discussion?
(No response.)

CHAIR OWENS: Are we ready for the -UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Is that the primary motion?

CHAIR OWENS: The two motions.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Was there a second to the motion to table, or had that motion been made?

CHAIR OWENS: It was made and the second.

SENATOR LUCAS: Okay. Just wanted to know how I'm going to vote.

CHAIR OWENS: Substitute motion was to table it, and have another Education Committee meeting for more information back. SENATOR RUFF: Right. CHAIR OWENS: Do we need to have a roll call?

SENATOR RUFF: I think we need to. CHAIR OWENS: All those in favor of the substitute motion.
(Roll Call, 8 to 6).
MR. FEINMAN: The motion carries, 8-6.

CHAIR OWENS: We are going to schedule a meeting.

MR. FEINMAN: We will schedule a meeting prior to -- We regularly have Executive Committee meeting well in advance of the May meeting so that we can prepare the dockets. We can schedule an Education Committee simultaneous to that, and we can invite our community college partners to join us.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Does that mean

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late March?
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SENATOR LUCAS: Mr. Chairman, does that mean that the second part of the motion, is that moot?

CHAIR OWENS: Yes.
MR. FEINMAN: Yes.
MR. OWEN: Do we have any other report?

SENATOR LUCAS: No, sir. I just had those two. That concludes my report.

CHAIR OWENS: Thank you.
I understand Mr. Miles is going to take care of the Southern Virginia Committee.

MR. MILES: Yes, sir. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We had a busy, but short meeting yesterday for the Southern Virginia Committee yesterday. I have several motions.

The first motion regards to table

1 applications -- I'm sorry. The first motion regards Campbell County, Southern Virginia Precision Agriculture and Farm Efficiency Grant Number 3891.

I would move that the Commission accept the Southern Virginia Committee recommendation to approve a $\$ 505,000$ grant award for Project Number 3891 Conditional Cost Share Funding being limited to only first time recipients for practices previously funded by the Tobacco Commission.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
CHAIR OWENS: Any other objections?
MR. FEINMAN: If I may make a request of the secretary. If we could do these in a block, and then vote the full.

MR. MILES: Continue with the block.
Project Number 3895, Martinsville-Henry County
Chambers, Partnership for Economic Growth, Startup/Grow Martinsville-Henry County Expansion. I would add that to the block, in terms of the Commission accepting the Southern Virginia Committee recommendation to approve $\$ 103,575$ grant award project for 3895 , for expanded on leadership, training and business incentives for startup MHC\&E/MHC program. So I would put those in a block as they are tabled.

CHAIR OWENS: Thank you. We are
going to vote on these in a moment. Does anyone want to take these out of the block?

CHAIR OWENS: We will vote on the block. All those in favor, signify by saying aye.
(Affirmative response.)
CHAIR OWENS: Opposed?

MR. MILES: My second motion, Mr. Chairman, regarding extension and modification for the Town of Brodnax, Depot Renovation Project, Number 2975. I'd move, Mr. Chairman, that the Commission accept the Southern Virginia Committee recommendation to include a final extension for 18 months, to June 30, 2023. Project 2975. Conditioned on the identifying the source for any additional funding, construction bids are over budget in order to allow the project to remain on schedule for completion. That would be my motion, Mr. Chairman. CHAIR OWENS: Motion. Is there a second?

CHAIR OWENS: Final; right?

MR. MILES: Final. Yes, sir.
CHAIR OWENS: Any other discussion on

CHAIR OWENS: Ayes have it. Motion
carried.
Anything else, Mr. Miles?
MR. MILES: No, sir. That concludes the Southern Virginia Committee performance.

CHAIR OWENS: Southwest?
DELEGATE KILGORE: Yes, sir.
Mr. Chairman, we had our meeting yesterday. We approved staff recommendations on all the projects. I would move that the Commission accept the Southwest Virginia Committee recommendations taking the actions recommended by staff as listed in Pages 30-34, which states Project 3928, 3930, 3922, 3927, 3932, 3923, 3926,3929 and 3925.

DELEGATE KILGORE: That completes my report, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIR OWENS: Thank you.
TROF \& CBL Loan Updates, Mr. Sorrell?
MR. SORRELL: Thank you,
Mr. Chairman.
I'll give you a quick update where we are with our Tobacco Region Opportunity Fund and our Community Business Lending Program Fund.

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If you recall at our last meeting in September, the Commission requested that we receive a regular update, just like you'd receive a TROF. So on Page 63 in your packet, you'll see detailed information on our current TROF projects and programs. Projects under the TROF Program, you'll notice that we had two projects approved so far in fiscal year 2022. That is the same number we had back in September, but we are continuing to work through several more. We have six active estimates that could be potentially be utilized. We're at application that is down some from where we were in September, but I expect that to pick up as the year rolls on.

We had 13 TROF projects approved in fiscal year 2021 compared to 9 for fiscal year 2020. That is just a comparison. So far for fiscal 2021, we had a thousand jobs promised with projects that were approved at over $\$ 170$ million capital investments.

You will notice on Page 64 and 65, status of TROF loans that we have. We have 25 active loans, with $\$ 5.1$ million approved for loan funds, and about half of that remain to be repaid. All of those are regular, in terms of their repayment. As we get payments in, we continue to take those down.

Pages 67 and 68 reflect the status of

49 TROFs that remain active with concluded performance periods. I believe in September, we are at 59 active. So we continue to bring that, whittle this number down as performance concludes and we get all the performance data, we need to close the project and do so. It is a regular thing that we work on. This is where we gather the performance data and negotiate payment terms, and bring it to you, if you need to weigh in on them. Get those moving along.

Regarding the community based lending program, we currently have four applications that have been submitted and approved, and are under review. We still have several in draft form. Currently, we have about $\$ 12$ million offered in CDL loans.

If you recall, too, at the September meeting, I think you approved CDL loans that are over \$5 million and need to come back to the full Commission for approval.

We haven't had any of those at this point to do that. If we do, you would hear of them.

Before that, we have all of them are -- I think one of them is very close to being concluded. I think the loan terms have been accepted, and we're just working on signing off on the agreement. That is for our telecom application by the
local government for $\$ 4$ million. That would likely be the first one to completely close and be done.

We also have one in the agriculture industry that is continuing on, and one in the automotive industry that was submitted since our last meeting in September. That is secured by a private company. That one is progressing rapidly as well with, hopefully, terms to be completed shortly to the company .

Then, of course, we have one that was submitted this time last year for hospitality. I don't believe that has progressed further yet. I don't believe they have rejected the offer yet. So still is sort of in a holding pattern.

I think that is all $I$ have for my updates. Like I said, you can see them all listed on Page 66 of your packet as well. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIR OWENS: Any questions? (No response.)

CHAIR OWENS: Thank you for your report.

Other business, Mr. Feinman.
MR. FEINMAN: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I have a couple pieces of other business for you.

First, a minder all citizen members of the Commission should have gotten an email regarding the online filing of your financial disclosure. That is due February 1st. If you did not receive that email, let the staff know. We will make sure you get it. It is not fun to fill that thing out, but you absolutely have to do it.

If you don't do it, the Commonwealth will fine you and deduct it from your tax return. So go ahead and get it done. It is a dumb way to spend $\$ 200$ not to do it.

Second piece of information I have for you is the Virginia Department of Health State Loan Repayment Program for healthcare professionals. It is open now, and remains open through March 31st.

If you are aware of someone who is considering moving to the footprint and would like to get a little support in paying their loans, please direct them to that program. The Commission supports funding for that program to attract more talented medical professionals. We get that done, and they do a great job.

Relatedly, the Commission's own Talent Attraction Program, which of course focuses on engineering, IT, and a variety of other professions
for people who are interested in moving, working and being typically engaged in the footprint, will begin accepting applications on January 15th. That application period runs through March 31st.

The Commission will pay up to $\$ 12,000$ a year or a quarter of your outstanding loan balance, whichever is the lesser, each year for two years. You are eligible to reapply for an additional two years. This has been a very successful program. We've gotten a lot of talented new leaders across Southwest Virginia who joined our community as a result of this. Spread far and wide, and certainly let eligible businesses that you're in communication with, know that they can leverage this program as a recruiting device so they can go seek out new college graduates to come work for them. It is a great program. We encourage folks to pursue it. We have all the details on the Commission website.

Last, if $I$ may take a moment of personal privilege. There has been new administration, or there will be shortly. I do not know for certain whether or not I'll be carrying on with the Commission or not. If $I$ am, it will be a pleasure to continue to work with you all. If I am not, I just want to say that it has been an absolute
privilege to serve as a member of the Commission and working with each of you. I believe we have done an awful lot of important work to support the region.

I also want to say that I stepped into this role as somebody a lot of folks didn't know, either on the staff or the Commission. Everyone welcomed me with incredibly open arms. The staff, in particular, is not heralded often enough. Everyone who is on this very small, very high performance agency staff does incredible work. It has been a true privilege to lead each and every one of y'all.

So if we do not move forward together, $I$ just want to say publicly that $I$ have never worked with a greater or more talented set of people, and $I$ have enjoyed every minute of it.
(Applause.)
MR. FEINMAN: That's all I have, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIR OWENS: Before I open up for public comment -- You stole a little of my thunder here, because I had in my notes to thank the staff for the wonderful job they do every time.

It is difficult to set up a meeting. In these times, it is ten times more difficult. I appreciate what you do. The Commission what you do
and have done over the years, and look forward to working with each and every one of you. It is going to be the last time for some folks, our last official meeting.

We thank administration for all they have done in helping us through this process. Again, change is good, and then change is not always good. Need institutional knowledge where you are. We accumulated some.

Mr. Feinman, I don't what is going to happen, but $I$ know it has been a pleasure to work with you.

MR. FEINMAN: Likewise.
CHAIR OWENS: I tell people all the time, not a matter right or wrong. It is just your point of view. Always the right time to do right. If you have the same point of view, it would help. We thank you for what you have done.

Senator Lucas, did you want to say something?

SENATOR LUCAS: I just echo what you said.

MR. SORRELL: I just wanted to mention real quick that the Commission's Annual Report is completed and is up on the Commission's website.

1 Let us know -- We didn't get it printed and ready for you for this meeting, but it is ready in electronic form. We'll have it printed probably next week by the Department of General Services. As soon as it is available, we'll be happy to mail copies. Just wanted to let you guys know.

DELEGATE RASOUL: Mr. Chairman, I'm going to defer to the second chair, as I was going to thank the Secretary and the Deputy Secretary for their service.

SECRETARY: Thank you for. It has
been a real joy and a true honor as Secretary of Agriculture, working more closely with the team at Commerce and Trade. I just want to echo the remarks from Mr. Chairman. Thank Evan for his leadership and the team. You all have done a tremendous job. We ask lots of hard questions, and sometimes we have challenging discussions. Appreciate all that you have done and will continue to do moving forward.

I would also just like to mention, we have been able to advance so many agriculture projects together, and I thank you all, not only staff, but the members around the table that have helped us do that. Our number one industry and being third largest
industry, we have had 57 facility grants just in this administration. Many of those, we have been able to leverage to Commission funding. We have one more to come that will be announced soon. We are just really excited about what we have been able to do.

I regret that I couldn't be with you yesterday for more discussions that were in the committee meetings. Really excited, the projects we funded just today to approve and move those forward. We actually have someone out in the field looking at an AG project, and a great feature to one of our schools for the next generation and what you have been doing to educate. We know have a great future. I just want to thank you and enjoyed the work with all of you, and look forward to what is to come with the future.
